

Manuscript Readiness Checklist

For authors with notes, drafts, chapters, or a nearly finished manuscript who want to know what kind of support comes next.

Use this checklist to decide whether your manuscript is ready for editing, organizing, or publishing support.

You do not need every box checked before asking for help. Unchecked boxes are often the most useful clues. They show where structure, clarity, or outside guidance can save time and prevent manuscript spaghetti. Good on the page, questionable in the bowl.

Structure

A strong manuscript has a visible framework: the reader can tell where they are, why they are there, and where they are going next.

Content Gaps

Gaps are not failures. They are invitations to strengthen the reader's experience before the book goes into deeper editing.

Audience Clarity

Formatting does not need to be fancy at this stage. It does need to be consistent enough that an editor or publishing guide can work efficiently.

Publishing Readiness

Publishing readiness means the book is moving from private draft to public promise. This is where clarity becomes kindness for both author and reader.
